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Introduction

These Bible reflections come to you from <u>Nungalinya College</u> (www.nungalinya.edu.au). The College is formally supported by the Anglican, Uniting and Catholic churches of the Northern Territory and is located in Casuarina, a northern suburb of Darwin.

Since 1974, Nungalinya College has been equipping men and women of Australian First People's groups for leadership roles in churches and communities. Our training programs explore the Christian faith contextually through courses in Foundation Studies, Bible Overview, Media, Music and Discipleship, Art, Christian Ministry and Theology, and Bible Translation.

In the reflections, we hear different Nungalinya College leaders share on the theme of 'Dwelling in love' informed by group bible studies on 1 Corinthians 13 and John 15. To prepare for sharing we did group bible studies focusing on the context of 1 Corinthians 13 and St Paul's reflections on the sharing of the Lord's Supper. We also did group bible studies on John 15 reflecting on the context of 'I am the vine, you are the branches'. We washed each others' feet and thought about the connection between serving and being connected to Jesus. One reflection, 'Speaking in love', by Yurranydjil Dhurrkay, was recorded for the UCA Queensland Synod Bible study on Ephesians 4:15-16.

- · and what actions are you called to?


This approach is based on the Swedish Bible Study Method and is regularly used at Nungalinya College.

2021 Reflections 1 Corinthians 13

Knowing the Context

Rev Deacon Maratja Dhamarrandji is a leader of the Northern Regional Council of the Uniting Aboriginal and Islander Christian Congress. He is a former chair of the Nungalinya Board and is currently participating in language workshops at Nungalinya. In these workshops, people from different language groups do bible study together and then record reflections in their own language. He was ordained in 2017 and graduated from Nungalinya with Certificate 4 in Christian Ministry and Theology in 2014. He is an accomplished bible



translator, having been part of the team that produced the Djambarrpuyŋu Bible, launched in 2008. He is the author, with Jione Havea, of "Receive, Touch, Feel, and Give Raypirri." In Indigenous Australia and the Unfinished Business of Theology: Cross-cultural Engagement, edited by Jione Havea, 9-15. New York: Palgrave, 2014 and two other 2022 publications with Jione Havea.

In this reflection Rev Dhamarrandji shares with us about the Yolŋu way of knowing. He shares something of himself and his journey and then pays respect to different parts of his family. He gives us a glimpse of the *Gurrutu* (kinship) and Mälk (subsection or skin name) systems. He is introducing us to one of Australian First Peoples' views of the world where the whole creation exists in a complex set of relationships.

When you reflect on your own relationship with the whole creation what stands out to you? Is the view of the world shared by Rev Dhamarrandji similar to yours? What do you think this view can teach you?

Marlene Boko is currently studying Certificate 4 in Christian Ministry and Theology. She is from Aputula (Finke). Marlene shares with us some of the context of 1 Corinthians 13.

When have you most recently heard 1 Corinthians 13 used as a basis for preaching? Thinking about the larger context of the Scripture what other points might you add to the context given to us by Marlene?

Wäŋgarr Dhamarrandji is a teacher at Nungalinya College in the Certificate II Music, Media and Discipleship course. She is also doing Certificate 4 in Christian Ministry and Theology. 
Wäŋgarr shares about the importance of learning from creation to learn more about God's love. How could learning from creation help keep you in God's love in your leadership roles?



Genesis 1 Creation Story Lorraine Granites Yuendumu



Guest Speaker: Kirsty Burgu



Kirsty Burgu is a Ngarinyin Worrorra woman and was born and lives at Mowanjum Community. She is the Uniting Church Pastor at Mowanjum. She was recently featured on ABC Compass 'God is a Wandjina'

Kirsty is as intensely engaged with the traditional culture of her people as she is with Christianity. She deftly portrays the stories and philosophy of these two worlds within her work, where she regularly depicts the first two Wandjina Idjair the father (God) and Wodjin the son (Jesus).

Kirsty is a Director of both Dambimangari Aboriginal Corporation and Mowanjum Aboriginal Corporation, and in the past has served on Mowanjum Artists Spirit of the Wandjinia Aboriginal Corporation. Further to her community and cultural responsibilities Kirsty is an active artist at Mowanjum Art and Culture Centre. If this is not enough, she is illustrating a childrens' book for publishing house Magabala Books Broome WA.

In 2021, Kirsty was a Finalist in the prestigious Blake Prize at the Casula Powerhouse Arts Centre Liverpool NSW. 86 artists were shortlisted from 1,200 submitted entries internationally, so an outstanding acknowledgement for this artist. Idjair (father) on the left, and Wodjin (son) on the right are the first two Wandjina. Wandjina are sacred ancestral beings who created the land and brought law, culture and language, and still to this day control the elements, the flora and fauna, and humans.

The emu represents the Milky Way (Wallungunda), and the kangaroo is the carrier of law and also represents my clan. They can both be seen in the Milky Way on cold wintery nights.

Idjair told two Ungud snakes that lived in the earth's core to come to the surface and slither around to make the land, rivers and water ways. The earth was still but the motion of the snakes moving in opposite direction made the earth begin to turn.

At the bottom are four Wandjina: three males represent the language groups ¹from the West Kimberley of Western Australia. Left to right is Namarali (Worrorra), Rimidjmarra (Wunambal) and Wanalirri (Ngarinyin). The fourth figure is Jilinya, mother of all people.

Two owl-lets sit on the shoulders of Idjair and Wodjin, and represent the moieties (or marriage system) which are Wodoi and Jungkun. A Jungkun man can only marry a Wodoi woman, and vice versa.

Mandy Mangurra is a teacher at Nungalinya, an Anglican Church leader, and a burgeoning artist. Here she shares her reflection on her painting Transforming.

"The seeds fall to the ground and begin to grow in the ground. Those new plants are dependent on the environment they are growing in.

God gives everything those plants need to grow in that place. This is like us - we need to be in our community. We need to share his love with our own people. We need to be transforming our own community and helping them to grow."

I am a teacher at Our Lady of Sacred Heart Catholic School in Wadeye

We are here for a purpose. We are here because God made us.

I will tell one special story about a tree growing up with lots of branches. A tree is God and the branches are us and the seeds and flowers are our children. And the tree, the branches, the seeds are all God's message and the flowers is where we spread the good news.



It is like a particular tree that we know is good for fruit that we eat in a certain season.

The message of God gives us strength to follow Jesus - just like when we eat the fruit from this particular tree.

When we hear the good news from God that is like the fruit that we eat is good and when we see a poisonous tree with fruit we don't eat that poisonous fruit.

In listening to good news there are times when we need to prepare ourselves knowing that one day we will face God. We need to see and listen always to the word of God and pray and continue our daily lives listening to God's words.

The good tree represents our God. Listen and eat the good fruit.

When we walk out bush there are lots of good trees with good fruits and not so good trees with poisonous fruit.

God gives the message to Jesus and Jesus spreads the good news to his friends and friends spread the good news to the people and the people share it with us.

And these are the things our old people and our parents have taught us - just like spreading the good news - We are taught these are the fruits that we eat. Just like we are taught in many different ways the stories of the Bible. For example, we hear from the priest and so many other people and churches about the good news.

So in your own life you think about yourself as a tree growing or use other images to think about your faith. So the tree, the branch, the flowers - the flowers blossom. They are beautiful, their smell, their taste is God's word that we all listen to and pray to be faithful in God's ways.

Resting in love

Robert Maliwalnawuy Gaykamaŋu and Milminydjarrk Helen Garrawurra are church leaders at Miliŋimbi, in North East Arnhem Land. In 2021 they graduated with Certificate 4 in Christian Ministry and Theology at Nungalinya. They are very active members of their local congregation, encouraging and supporting the pastors, Peter Rripinganan and Melissa



Yimayima. They love singing and dancing and share with us a little of their stories, a reflection on being joined to Jesus, the vine, and then a song "Djesuy nhuna nhä**ŋ**ala". The song speaks to them of being always held in God's love.
