Draft Program

Presenters will explore what lessons from the past will best prepare the church to maintain and strengthen its prophetic witness in the future.

- **Rev Dr Alistair McCrae**, former President of the Uniting Church in Australia and former senior minister, Wesley Uniting Church Melbourne, will open the whole theme of the Church as a Prophetic Voice in Australian Society with a **Keynote Address**.
- **Dr Judith Raftery**, making use of biblical perspectives will set the scene on Saturday morning exploring the opportunities and challenges of offering prophetic witness to society whilst being called to both citizenship and discipleship.
- A uniquely Canberra experience is on offer in the Panel Discussion featuring:
 - Gordon Ramsay, Chief Executive Officer ACT Cultural Facilities Corporation, ACT Government member from 2016-2020 and former Executive Minister at Kippax Uniting Church; and
 - <u>Lin Hatfield Dodds</u>, most recently Chief Executive Officer of the Benevolent Society, previously the Deputy Secretary for Social Policy in the Department of Prime Minister and Cabinet, and former National Director of UnitingCare Australia; and
 - <u>John Williams</u>, founding member of the Wentworth Group of Concerned Scientists, former Chief of the Division of Land and Water, CSIRO and former Chief Scientist and Chair of the NSW Department of Natural Resources' Science and Information Board.
- Offering a prophetic voice from global to local, Rev Professor Glen O'Brien will explore the Uniting
 Church's role as part of the global communion of Methodist churches. Dr Christine Weir will review
 UCA Assembly Disarmament Debates of the 1970s and 80s as Australia seeks to define its place in the
 world, particularly the Pacific.
- In contrast **Rev Dr Dean Eland** will share the experience of South Sydney congregations engaging in prophetic ministry at the community level during the 1960s and 1970s. **Dr Glen Powell** will further develop the theme of community engagement and the Uniting Church's involvement with Sydney Alliance, a coalition of faith groups, trade unions and community organisations.
- The Church's commitment to securing the rights of our First Peoples will be shared through recalling the
 prophetic voices of Rev Charles Harris, Rev Bernie Clarke and Rev Edgar Wells, as related by Rev Dr
 William Emilsen, Andrew Clarke and Rev Jonathan Barker respectively. Dr Patricia Curthoys will
 share the 'hands on' engagement of the NSW Christian Youth Council in providing housing for Aboriginal
 communities to counter the racism, prejudice and discrimination experienced by Aborigines in 1960s
 Australia.
- The call and challenge for churches to be an inclusive and 'safe place' in contemporary society will be
 addressed by Sarah Lim, National Director of UCA Redress Ltd, responding to the Royal Commission
 into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse, on driving and embedding a culture of safeguarding
 for all vulnerable people in Church communities. Warren Talbot will share how the Uniting
 Church has exercised a prophetic voice on several matters affecting LGBTIQA+ communities in
 Australia.
- Churches influence in the forming of Australia's 1901 Federation will be explored by Clive Jackson.
 Margaret Reeson and Rev Leanne Davis will recount the advocacy by church women for greater representation in 1890s Australia. Leanne will focus on the nine-year fight in South Australia for the right to vote in, and stand for election, paving the way for women's political equality in the new Commonwealth of Australia in 1901.
