A worship service for faith communities to stand in solidarity with Australia's First Peoples as we remember and reflect on the effects of invasion, forced dispossession, oppression and suffering.

We acknowledge that God has been present in these lands for thousands of generations, and we can claim the promises of Jesus to write a new story of a walking together in faith, hope, justice and love.



COVER ARTWORK:

The above artworks depict the story of Christ's presence being amongst First Peoples of these lands of his creation for generation. His teachings have been long been displayed within the stories, songs, dances and ceremony First Peoples have used them to connect with God as great Creator and teacher for our communities.

We, as First Peoples mourn the heartbreaking inequities our past and present generations have and continue to suffer, and we seek to create new ways into a light filled future, by fully claiming the promises Jesus has made to us. We hold deep sorrow for what has been lost forever, and pray that the souls of those who have come before us, know the peace of our Lord, amongst their heavenly home. As a young Aboriginal woman, I show my honour for the sacrifices and heartbreak of my Elders, by seeking to grasp with both hands, all of the opportunities that have been hard fought for my benefit. I seek to know, and be comforted by the light of Jesus, and to let that light shine into the darkness of our daily struggles and suffering.

DAY OF MOURNING Introduction

17th December 2025

Each year, on the Sunday before 26 January, our Church gathers in truth-telling, lament, and hope as we mark the Day of Mourning. This is not simply an observance—it is a spiritual discipline and a covenant commitment. In 2015, the Assembly accepted the request of the Uniting Aboriginal and Islander Christian Congress (UAICC) that our whole Church pause to remember the ongoing impacts of invasion, dispossession, and injustice on First Peoples. Through this request, Congress invited the Church to walk more faithfully in the promises we made in 1994 when we entered into Covenant.

That Covenant named the pain caused when the Church failed to hear the wisdom, spirituality, and leadership of First Peoples. It confessed the harm that came when the gospel of Jesus Christ was confused with colonising ways. And it committed us to a different path—one shaped by humility, truth, justice, and life-giving relationships. This Day of Mourning invites us again to live into that promise, not for one Sunday alone, but as part of an ongoing journey of covenant faithfulness for our whole Church.

We recognise that congregations come to this day carrying different histories, emotions, and understandings. Some approach it with deep sorrow; some with uncertainty; others with a longing to do better. Wherever we are on that journey, we are held by the same God whose love calls us into deeper relationship.

The Scriptures appointed for this Sunday speak powerfully into our shared story. Isaiah promises that the people who walked in darkness have seen a great light—a light that does not deny the darkness but transforms it from within.

The artwork accompanying this resource reflects this truth with beauty and courage: the pathways of sorrow, the strength of ancestors, the movement of Christ's healing light through story, community, and Country.

In the gospel, Jesus calls ordinary people to leave old patterns behind and follow him into a new way of life grounded in justice, compassion, and shared purpose. Paul urges the early church to be "knit together" despite their differences—an image that resonates deeply for us as First and Second Peoples seeking a common life marked by respect, equity, and reconciliation.

This resource has been shaped through the leadership, spirituality, and wisdom of UAICC, and we receive it with deep gratitude. It calls the whole Church into worship that is honest, courageous, and filled with the hope of Christ. It invites us to listen deeply, to acknowledge the truth of our shared history, and to participate in God's work of restoration and right relationship across this land.

So, as we gather on Sunday 25 January 2026, we encourage every congregation and community of faith to enter this day with open hearts.

Grieve with your First Peoples communities. Stand in solidarity.

Pray for healing for our nation.

Commit yourselves anew to the long journey of justice, peace, and covenant relationship.

May the Holy Spirit guide us as we weave threads of love across this land, trusting that God is restoring, renewing, and reconciling all creation.

The Uniting Church in Australia (UCA) observes an annual Day of Mourning for First Peoples on the Sunday before January 26th.

This significant observance, requested by the Uniting Aboriginal and Islander Christian Congress (UAICC), is an expression of the UCA's Covenant relationship and commitment to truth-telling and justice. It calls on congregations to:

- **1. Lament** the devastating effects of invasion and colonisation, including dispossession, violence, and ongoing injustices against Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.
- 2. Acknowledge the Church's own complicity in this history.
- **3. Affirm** the sovereignty and resilience of First Peoples and honour their continued cultural and spiritual life to Country.
- **4. Commit** anew to the journey of reconciliation, healing, and standing in solidarity with First Peoples in their struggle for justice.

There is a continued call for Justice, not Charity – a demand for true self-determination, equality and equity in an honoured shared future together with integrity.

The Day of Mourning provides a crucial moment for deep reflection, confession, listening, and prayer, shaping a shared future for First and Second Peoples in Australia.

Worship Resource

CALL TO WORSHIP

PRAYERFUL ACTION:

(The words in red within the prayer are body actions that the gathered congregation can participate in as the call to worship is spoken. This can be led by the worship leader or others as appropriate)

Our Lord is alive amongst all things of creation. (Lift your hand to your ears)

The sounds of the rivers in motion, the waves of the seas. (Make a motion of the waves with your hands)

The scents of the gum trees and native flowers on the winds. (Stand still with your legs firmly planted, take some deep breathes, stretch up both arms and sway like a tree in the breezes.)

You made the earth to give us life and daily sustenance and it is on Country that we find a place to retreat and walk alongside you in whispering conversation.

(Rub hands together to make the sound of a whispering conversation)

Today we come together, and we bring our full voices, to lift them in praise of our triune God.

(Lift arms wide to praise God together)

We ask for forgiveness for not always being the givers of love and hospitality. (Bring hands together in prayerful pose)

And, we look to have our hearts made clean.

(Use your right hand to catch the love of Christ and rub it onto your chest over your heart)

(Together)
Lord our father of unconditional love,
we come in repentance and hope

Jesus, son of guiding and teaching love, we come to listen, learn and act with courage.

Holy Spirit of multiplying love,

Additional Ideas for Chidren and Families

Suggested actions for the inclusion of children in the service.

- Use Gum leaves and native flowers to make a small posy
- Use clap sticks to keep a beat
- Make a dry riverbed with river stones
- Write words of what love looks like on small pieces of paper of dried gum leaves. Place them in a wooden bowl or Coolamon

PRAYER OF CONFESSION (SPOKEN IN UNISON):

Merciful God, we, the Second Peoples of this land, acknowledge with sorrow the injustice and abuse that has so often marked the treatment of the First Peoples of this land.

We acknowledge with sorrow the way in which their land was taken from them and their language, culture and spirituality despised and suppressed.

We acknowledge with sorrow the way in which the Christian church was so often not only complicit in this process but actively involved in it.

We acknowledge with sorrow that in our own time the injustice and abuse has continued.

we have been indifferent when we should have been outraged, we have been apathetic when we should have been active, we have been silent when we should have spoken out.

Gracious God, forgive us for our failures, past and present. By your Spirit transform our minds and hearts so that we may boldly speak your truth and courageously do your will.

Through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

HYMN/SONG OF CONFESSION:

PRAYER FOR THE JOURNEY OF HEALING (preferably spoken by a First Nations person):

Oh God, your love is wider than our differences, larger than our loneliness, and stronger than our sorrows.

At times we may doubt that we are able to overcome hostilities we feel towards others, or have felt towards us,

Yet you invite us to experience that through surrender and obedience to your great and reconciling love, we are able to see more clearly the beautiful picture of your gift of a wondrous creation.

We are reminded of the words of Paul to the church in Rome calling us to peace and hope through faith, grace and perseverance:

"Therefore, since we have been justified through faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have gained access by faith into this grace in which we now stand. And we boast in the hope of the glory of God. Not only so, but we also glory in our sufferings, because we know that suffering produces perseverance; perseverance, character; and character, hope. And hope does not put us to shame, because God's love has been poured out into our hearts through the Holy Spirit, who has been given to us."

Oh God, we know the work of reconciliation is not simple.

It requires peoples who may feel suffering through dispute, to look at each other as we would look to reconciling with you God; to see the joy in working to live amongst each other in peace, in a creation made for us.

Peace given from you God, with you God, and in you God.

Help us to reckon with the challenge that reconciliation between First and Second Peoples must begin with reconciling ourselves in truth and humility with you, our God.

Then we can do the work of being peacemakers and justice seekers, in understanding what we may need to know better, to be able to act responsibly and respectfully.

Oh God our hope for the coming season of faith in our Uniting Church, is that we look towards each other as peoples of God, who wish to be supported to live freely, in enjoying the giving of spiritual care for each other, through wonder and worship.

We bring our truth-telling, our lament and our confessions to you God, In the name of Jesus Christ,
Who bore our sins,
And is the great reconciler.

DECLARATION OF FORGIVENESS:

Water for First Peoples is always a sign of God's peace and fulfillment in everything that is good. The promise of food, of harmony with ourselves, and the creation around us.

At the very beginning Creator God blessed the waters, God's great gift to us and renewed in this water here today.

God who hovered over the waters, invites us to 'come to the water' to drop our heavy burdens of lament and confession.

Hear then the words of Christ's forgiveness to us all: Your sins are forgiven, and you are cleansed and made new again. Go now and live as my reconciled people. In the name of Christ, Amen.

So then, let us bring the heavy stones that we are carrying and drop them into the water of healing and life.

SONG and PRAYERFUL ACTION:

(While music is playing, invite people to bring their stones forward to place in a bowl of water, symbolising the waters of baptism and cleansing of forgiveness and life.)

come to seek and know you and trust in your love and compassion. Father you are good.

All: Lord fill our hearts with Love and Compassion

Leader: We pray for all Elders, those who are sick, the dying, the imprisoned, those who are lost and suffering – we ask for your protection, healing and mercy for all.

Father you are good.

All: Lord fill our hearts with Love and Compassion

Leader: Lord thankyou for your Mercy which covers all our Sins and for the love which you wash over us. Please help us to be strong in Faith and to love everyone as you taught us.

Father you are good.

All: Lord fill our hearts with Love and Compassion

Leader: Let us all take a moment's silence as we pray for our personal intentions to our God.

Father you are good.

All: Lord fill our hearts with Love and Compassion

Leader: God, our loving Father, you reveal your care and compassion to us through the life, words and deeds of your son Jesus. Grant us the gift of your compassion so that all peoples may enjoy your promise of peace. With humble hearts we make our prayer through Christ our Lord.

People of God, go from here to live out the covenant into which we, the First and Second Peoples of this land, have entered with one another.

Confront and challenge injustice wherever you see it.

Act justly yourselves and insist that others do the same.

Rejoice in the richness of our diverse cultures and learn from them.

Celebrate and demonstrate the unity we share in Jesus our Lord.

Commit to worship, witness and serve as one people under God.

BLESSING

May the God of all wonder who set the stars in the sky, bless you with relentless unsettledness that drives you to seek truth.

May the God of all justice who gave motion to the rivers, bless you with righteous anger that drives you to seek freedom for all.

May the God of all love who placed laughter in the kookaburra, bless you with the friendship that looks like the love where one lays down their life for another.

May the God of all comfort who determined the height of the mountains, bless you with tears from shared pain and mourning that shows you hope.

Now with wonder, righteous anger, sacrifice, and lament Go in truth, justice, love, and hope to Change The Heart of Australia."
